Matthew 5:13-16 You are the salt of the earth; but if the salt loses its flavor, how shall it be seasoned? It is then good for nothing but to be thrown out and trampled underfoot by men. You are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do they light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a lampstand, and it gives light to all who are in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven.

I recall participating in a large Sunday service as a child. The worship leader started the service by leading us in a time of prayer, then singing, and soon after, asked the pastor to come and deliver his sermon. The pastor joined the large congregation through a door that was conveniently placed behind the pulpit. The door would allow him to not only avoid small talk before the service but would also prove to be a great escape route after finishing his message.

I'm sure we have all seen pastors that are disconnected from the flock and who feel like the entirety of their duty is in delivering a 20-25-minute motivational speech inspired by Tony Robbins himself.

Today, we don't even need an escape hatch for pastors to be absent from their flock. "Sermons" are efficiently streamed in the comfort of your home via a recording from the comfort of the pastor's home. So streamlined and convenient, no one even thinks twice as long as the tithing is up.

Surely that passage in Hebrews is antiquated, is it not?

Hebrews 10:24-25 Let us consider one another in order to stir up love and good works, not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as is the manner of some, but exhorting one another, and so much the more as you see the Day approaching.

Elders/Pastors are called to "shepherd the flock of God which is among you, serving as overseers, not by compulsion but willingly, not for dishonest gain but eagerly; nor as being lords over those entrusted to you, but being examples to the flock; and when the Chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the crown of glory that does not fade away." 1 Peter 5:2-4

All that to say, when you do get to shake the hand of a true shepherd leader, count it as a privilege. If you

are blessed with such a leader, pray for them often!

I was blessed to meet pastor Roma from Druzhkovka, Ukraine.

As often is the case in this part of the world, a pastor's job is non-stop. They not only serve the congregation by preaching the Word of God but become an integral part of the life of their parishioners, well exceeding even what is Scripturally required of them.

Druzhkovka was not part of our initial itinerary, but a trusted brother insisted that we stop by and visit with brother Roma.

We drove up and were welcomed by the sweet aroma of freshly baked bread. I need to point out that it was a Saturday, and the baked bread aroma

was not a marketing gimmick to boost church membership by pleasing the olfactory (like realtors suggest owners baking cookies when they are showing a home to manipulate the senses), but rather a ministry that the church had taken on to serve their community.





Pastor Roma tends to the fire of a new type of oven that can bake bread using only small pieces of wood and mostly cardboard, while his wife and a team of volunteers knead and shape loaf after loaf. Those in need are welcome to take the



bread for free, while the others can purchase their loaves 50% cheaper than the going rate in town. The monies collected cover the cost of the free bread distributed and help fund various projects around their small church.

The pastor showed us around and shared that their largest demographic was the children. After continued growth, having as many as 60 children participating in Sunday school, in faith, they broke ground on a three-room addition for this purpose.



Pastor Roma shared how the project never stagnated because of a lack of funds. Working alongside volunteer construction workers. pastor Roma never stopped smiling. Not only was he wearing many hats, but he was also doing so joyfully, being an example of service to his flock as unto the Lord.



We prayed with our brothers and thanked them for their dedication to the Lord as servants. We left some money with them for their project and pray that we can continue to support their work.

The following day, I received pictures with the wood beams required to continue the work; the bill was for the exact amount we had given them. We thank God for His Providence!

For those wondering, yes, we received samples of the oven-hot bread, which was delicious.



Child of the Month

Carla, born in 2008, comes from a family of 4 children living in Botosani county. The family's oldest child has been in foster care, living with a relative since he was only three months old. The local Child Protection authorities have always focused on their situation, attempting to make the parents sensitive to the importance of adequately raising, caring for, and loving their children.

their children. Being the only adult in the home and the only one who could work, the father stayed at work all day long, struggling to bring home as much money as possible. The neighbors noticed that the children would frequently remain alone in the house, deprived of the essential resources: food, water, light, heat.

Their family problems escalated once the fourth child was born in December 2012. The family doctor monitoring the child's development in his first months of life noticed a total lack of care. They were often left alone in the house with no food and no heat.

Additionally, the newborn child was urgently transferred to a foster family due to lack of food and the imminent prospect of losing his life.

Carla and her brother, Vlad, the two remaining children, were often silent witnesses to constant conflicts involving verbal and physical abuse between their parents at home.

Carla's mother struggled with alcohol and neglected her children, leaving them alone while the father was at work.

On one of those days, the father forced his wife to leave their house as she manifested no interest or love whatsoever in raising



Vlad's right palm was burned because of such deprivation and lack of parental control. The scar tissue prevented Vlad's normal development, leaving him with a visible deficiency in the correct function of his hand.

We welcomed Carla and Vlad to our family in 2013. We were overjoyed to see them adjust to their new environment and slowly start their path to maturity.

Carla is in the 7th grade. She is a studious young girl and would like to continue her education. She loves reading, listening to music, and playing soccer. She has a strong relationship with her brother, and together they spend part of their school breaks with their father or aunt. She desires to get a job and help her father as much as possible. We know God is the One able to mend their wounds and restore their family. May they be obedient to our God and experience the hope and love that He wants to pour over them!

Dear Brethren,

Every pursuit or endeavor must start with an end goal in mind. It cannot be vague or lacking detail, at least if you want it to succeed in any meaningful way. After an end goal has been established, a rational, logical human being would then sit down and account for time, energy, resources, and steps it would take to reach it. The fact that we are living in the last days is becoming increasingly undeniable. Everything Jesus forewarned us of, from wars and rumors of war to pestilences, division, and animosity among humanity, is playing out before our eyes.

Since to be forewarned is to be forearmed, if the season we are entering into finds us ill-equipped, unprepared, or asleep, we will have no one to blame for our inaction but ourselves. What more could God have done than what He has already done to wake the church from its slumber? What more could God have done than what He has already done to make the household of faith aware of just how perilous these times would be?

The entirety of the end times landscape has been laid out meticulously within the pages of Scripture. Yet, most do their utmost to find ways of ignoring, minimizing, or skirting those passages. From the ever-popular "Those scriptures weren't meant for us" to the likewise in vogue "We're not going to be here for those times" rather than prepare, the church is justifying its indifference.

Every day we are hoping for better, and it just gets worse. The reason for this is twofold: first, we are hoping that politicians, policies, and politics will make it better rather than God. Second, we hope this will get better with us standing on the sidelines and having no skin in the game.
