Being among the children again, watching their faces, seeing their smiles and seeing how they have grown and developed is a constant reminder not only of why we labor, but that our labors are not in vain. Sometimes it is easy to lose sight of why one does what they do. I've had friends and acquaintances that have started businesses that ended up doing quite well, others who have worked their way up in a company, only to lose sight of what motivated them in the first place, and subsequently lose their desire, their passion and their drive for their chosen field. Some have become disillusioned, walking away, while others just keep going through the motions, hoping to get back that spark that they lost.

I, along with all the Hand of Help staff know exactly why we labor; we know exactly why we sacrifice of ourselves, and the fire that was started in our hearts some twelve years ago when the orphanage first opened, burns brighter than ever before in our hearts. Much of the staff here in Romania has been with us since the very beginning, and most of the children who were adolescents or teenagers when we first opened our doors, are already married, with children and families of their own. Some who live in the area, still visit from time to time, because to them, the Hand of Help orphanage is the closest thing to home they have ever known. It is heartwarming to see the previous generation that has passed through our doors come and spend time with the new generation of children, telling them of their experiences, of how it was when they first came, and how their time here changed them for the better. Each child that has ever resided here, or that currently resides here has a story. They are not happy stories, they are not stories of butterflies and cotton candy, summer days or puffy clouds, but rather they are stories of heartache and pain, disillusionment and loss. All of them have been scarred in some way, and for some even after years of feeling the warmth of love from our staff, and knowing that they are safe, the scars remain.

We do not live in a perfect world, and this is painfully obvious for each of us with each passing day. It is however in a cruel world that the light of love shines ever brighter, and it is in a heartless world that people with the heart of Christ are all the more visible. We are here, each of us, to be testimonies of what Christ can do, the hope that He can give, the love that He exudes, and the peace that He brings, in a loveless, hopeless, cruel and merciless world.

We have seen the change in the lives of the children here. We have witnessed the growth both in character and in wisdom as time continues its march, and we are daily reminded of the reality that God has called us to this work, God has made a way for us to continue this work when there seemed to be no way, and through this work and your prayers and support of it, lives were not only changed and transformed but also saved.



Romania Reflections

As we approached the airport in Iasi, Romania after a grueling 20 hours of in transit time, I physically found myself struggling. Severe allergies to dust make a long trip over the ocean in poorly ventilated, over crowded airplanes, downright miserable. Knowing custom's were on alert to be watching U.S. passengers for swine flu symptoms because President Obama had just announced the U.S. was at the state of a National Emergency for H1N1; I had all I could do to give the appearance that I was fine. Making the escape by a narrow margin, as a Nurse actually assisted me in filling out the form that checked off, no I do not have any symptoms etc. . . . As I walked away to greet my Romanian friend, I found myself in a moment of despair thinking to myself, in all my lifetime, when have I ever had to be concerned about a plague or epidemic? Indeed I felt in my spirit a confirmation to what I've been suppressing, like most other discerning Christians, indeed we are living in times that have not been yet known to man, end times.

⁶And ye shall hear of wars and rumors of wars: see that ye be not troubled: for all these things must come to pass, but the end is not yet. ⁷For nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom: and there shall be famines, and pestilences, and earthquakes, in diverse places. *Matthew 24:6-7*

I looked up the definition to pestilences and found **pestilence**, pestilence (pes'təl ans), noun, any virulent or fatal contagious or infectious disease, esp. one of epidemic proportions, as bubonic plague.

Putting aside my observations and conclusions, I embraced the change in culture, the beautiful Romanian countryside, and the people I've grown to love as family, the Boldea's, the worker's at the orphanage, and the adorable children whose faces I've recognized from many an email announcing their arrival and biography of their life's venture that led them to us.

Upon entering the gate at the orphanage I heard laughter from the children playing in the courtyard, I listened to the adults making their way to attend the evening service in the Messiah Church, also located on the grounds. sense of overwhelming contentment flooded my soul as I realized I was, in a small way, a part of this. Suddenly the old warecarpet, with the house, with the ugly desk

with the cold breeze coming through the window in Wisconsin, didn't seem to matter. Lives being rescued, souls being saved, provision for the widows and the orphans, that mattered, it matters to God.

It had been over 7 years since I had last been to the orphanage; many of the young children now were teenagers, where did that time go? The once white and institutional looking walls were now painted with character's from well known bible stories, cartoon characters, Disney characters, and other joyful scenes. As I walked up the steps of the orphanage to explore more fully, I heard giggling and playing coming from the teaching area. There I found 20 young children, all between the ages of 2-5. What a joy!! As I walked into the room, immediately reaching hands were extended for me to pick them up, and pick them up I did, giving each of them as much love as I could knowing this time would end and then have to become a memory to carry me once again.


Observations of continued hardship remained obvious as people continue to come to the gate at the Orphanage entrance to plea for help. Prices for food and clothing are comparable to the US, yet their income, if there is one to be found, is a mere fraction of what is needed to live on. Example taken from 2005 data;

A professor would make 2,168 lei per month, which would equal \$511.00

A Nurse would make 1,105 lei per month, which would equal \$268.00

A Car Mechanic would make 714 lei per month, which would equal \$161.00

Now to make that income stretch when gas is over \$5.00 per gallon in Europe, and food prices like that of the states. Is it even possible? I pray this gives your heart a greater burden and understanding of the hardship the average Romanian person endures. A bigger problem I perceive, as I see a massive exodus of youth fleeing the country to seek employment elsewhere, is leaving the older generation with no fiscal means of supporting the care they need. In fact, a great majority of the children we care for are from those who have been abandoned by parents who left to earn money for the family, but never returned. God our Father is faithful. As with the help from those who know His voice clearly, His sheep, they are tended to. Thank you for being faithful sheep, indeed the flock has grown because of your faithfulness to this work.



Dear Brethren

One need only look at the history of the church within the last generation or so, to see that our resolve has been weakened, and is almost nonexistent when it comes to defending the truth, or standing up for what we know to be just and right. For most people, silence and retreat is more acceptable than the defense of truth, because chances are very slim that one will get wounded while retreating. We weigh the matter judiciously, conclude that it's too small a thing to get worked up about, and back away slowly as to not stir the attention of the enemy. We don't like making waves and the enemy knows this. We have an aversion to being marginalized, to being mocked, to being ridiculed, to being persecuted, and so we would rather slink away in the middle of the night than confront the enemy. We have taken it upon ourselves to become negotiators, when we have been called to be messengers, to be spectators when we have been called to be soldiers. We have become passionately passionless, and purposefully purposeless for fear of offending the unregenerate and unrepentant.

With every retreat the enemy gains more ground, with every omission, with every act of cowardice on our part the enemy gets that much bolder, and continues his steady march.

For some reason we've come to believe that the enemy will simply stop short of our citadels, that he will stop short of besieging the towers if we just give up enough ground. Surely the enemy will be content with a partial victory, surely his desire is not to overrun the entire house of God. If this is what you believe, if you believe that the enemy will stop short, than you don't really know the enemy we face. His desire is the utter destruction of God's house, and he will not stop short of his goal. This is why we must stand, this is why we must boldly proclaim the truth and defend even those things we consider as insignificant or of little importance.

There is a passage in first Chronicles that details what I'm attempting to convey. At the beginning of David's reign, the Chronicler of the time took a census of David's mighty men, and among them was a man named Eleazar the son of Dodo the Ahohite.

1 Chronicles 11:13-14, "He was with David at Pasdammim. Now there the Philistines were gathered for battle and there was a piece of ground full of barley. And the people fled from the Philistines. But they stationed themselves in the midst of that field, defended it, and killed the Philistines. And the Lord saved them by a great deliverance."

Here was David and Eleazar, defending what amounted to a piece of ground full of barley. It wasn't like they were defending a city, it wasn't like they were defending Jerusalem, it was just some barley in a field. All of the people had fled, the Philistines were on their way, and they came to the conclusion that it was easier to let the Philistines have the piece of ground full of barley, than to risk their lives in order to defend it. David and Eleazar however, decided to stay and fight, they decided to make their stand for a piece of ground full of barley, and even risk their lives in order to defend it.

What we must understand, is that it wasn't the barley they were defending and risking their lives for, it was the principle of giving up ground to the enemy. David's principle was simple. We leave nothing to the Philistines. Whether a patch of earth or a handful of barley, David and Eleazar decided and purposed in their hearts, that they would give nothing to the enemy.

The spiritual principle that we learn from this exchange is as simple as it is profound. We must not be willing to leave anything for the enemy. If it comes to it, we must be ready and willing to go to war with Satan himself, even over something small, something that the world would look at and mock us for defending. Leave nothing for the enemy to exploit!

The sad and lamentable truth, is that the church in our modern age has given up allot of ground. Those who ought to have been mighty men, those who ought to have been warriors, decided it wasn't worth fighting over a patch of earth, it wasn't worth defending a handful of barley, so they simply retreated, and gave up ground. We refused to defend the small things because we thought them unworthy of our efforts, and the more ground we gave up, the bolder the enemy became. Soon enough, here the enemy stood at the castle walls, and now the church has gotten so used to running it has gotten so used to giving up ground, that it is having a difficult time mustering up the courage to defend the city itself.

Those of you with spiritual eyes and ears know exactly what I am talking about!

The last part of the verse we read is also worth repeating, because it reveals a second essential spiritual truth. When we stand our ground, when we defend the truth of God's word, when we are willing to put our reputations on the line for the sake of Christ, and suffer the mocking and scorn that will surely come from the godless, it is the Lord that will fight alongside us; it is the Lord who will ensure our victory.

All they had to do was stand and fight, all they had to do was be determined that they would not retreat, that they would not back down, that they would not give up ground to the Philistines.

The Word is very clear as to who gave David and Eleazar the victory.

"And the Lord saved them by a great deliverance."

It's not that the church is continually suffering defeat; it's that it hasn't even made its stand yet. Between those who prefer to be mere spectators, and consider that taking a stand for the truth isn't really for them, because well, they just want to preach a positive message, and be positive and create an atmosphere of positivity, and those who surrender to the enemy before the first sword is drawn or the first bow is strung, the number of true warriors, the number of those who are willing to defend the truth and make their stand is small indeed.

I've said it before and I will say it again, I do not trust men who call themselves warriors yet have no scars. I do not trust men who call themselves warriors yet their armor is in pristine condition, as though they had it pressed for a military funeral rather than scarred and worn as though they were standing on the front lines.

Make no mistake, we are at war, and this spiritual war is one in which there can be no spectators. There are only three options. We either flee from before the enemy, surrender to the enemy, or make our stand against the enemy.

I realize full well that some continue to be under the misconception that they can strike a truce with the enemy and somehow coexist. The only problem is that the enemy never honors your terms of surrender, and you will be a slave, and subject to his whims. Knowing that the enemy is merciless, ruthless, vile and heartless, his

whims will always gravitate toward creating an environment of pain, sorrow and heartache for those who surrender and give up the fight.

When we are faithful, when we honor God in the little things, when we look upon a patch of land and a handful of barley as David and Eleazar did and say in our hearts it is not dispensable, it is not expendable, it is worth defending and worth standing our ground over, we know that God stands with us, and though the enemy might outnumber us, it is the Lord who will save us by a great deliverance.
